Major Sir Hereward Wake Bt MC was the 60th Rifles Representative on the staff at Sandhurst before WWII when Field Marshal Sir Roland Gibbs was a Cadet and they both subsequently served as Company Commanders in 2KRRC in WWII.



## **The Field Marshal Sir Roland Gibbs GCB CBE DSO MC Memorial Window**

At the centre of the window is the Field Marshal's coat of arms: Argent three battle-axes erect within a bordure nebuly sable.

Above is his crest: In front of a rock, a dexter arm embowed in armour the hand in a gauntlet proper holding a battle-axe bendwise sinister sable.

His supporters are: (dexter): A man habited in buff leather jerkin, gloves and boots, armed with a three-barred helmet, long gorget and sword all proper, and holding in the exterior hand a battle-axe downwards sable; (sinister:) A Falcon wings displayed Or ducally gorged and jessed gules belled Gold.

Suspended from the arms are the badges of the Distinguished Service Order, the Military Division of the Order of the Bath, the Military Division of the Order of the British Empire, and the Military Cross.

Below his arms is placed the badge of The King's Royal Rifle Corps, on a red background to indicate his command in the Parachute Regiment.

At the bottom of the design is the emblem of Land Forces Persian Gulf, which the Field Marshal commanded, and at the top is a fox, which indicates his life-long love of hunting.
